






'Do not linger in the Shadows of Fear and Despair' Rev. Charissa Suli [UCA President—Easter Message]

It began in the shadows. A story of death - but also life.



But when they arrived, the stone was rolled away. Empty. And then: words that shattered the silence forever: "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; He has risen!"

The tomb – once a symbol of defeat – became the birthplace of courage. They came grieving and afraid and were called from their sorrow. They rose up. They ran and they proclaimed. Fear gave way to faith. Despair gave way to purpose.

How many hospital chaplaincy placements are there in the UCA?

I now know there's at least eight in Victoria after meeting with six of them at our first Community of Practice gathering hosted by Rev Lauren Mosso and Rev Isabel Greenall. These new gatherings come in response to the Synod chaplaincy strategy which includes a goal to develop and sustain a strong sense of Community of Practice for chaplains.

At this first meeting we shared our experiences by considering these questions:

What does it mean to be a UCA Chaplain? How do you connect with the Uniting Church beyond your

And how are you perceived/understood by the UCA in your role?

These are fundamental questions for anyone in a ministry setting placed outside of the traditional worship space. Our discussions reminded me of advice I was given from a fellow minister when I was preparing for ordination: ...

"Remember to stop and ask: "who's praying for me?".

Chaplains are not "sent out" by the church, they are "sent with": resources, blessings, encouragement, support. We nurture each other in these relationships as we connect with "the world" and allow "the world" to connect with us: to change us, renew us and strengthen us.





A LOOK AT THE SYNOD EMISSION REDUCTION FUND Climate Action Task Group

The Synod released funds of \$100 00 last year in order to support churches that wished to make progress towards zero emissions. Submissions were made and their total value was three times the allocation.

Decisions were made and the successful churches advised. Four of the approved projects were in the Presbytery of Port Phillip West, and you may like to read reports from two successful churches here.

BRUNSWICK UC

The Synod Emissions Reduction Fund (SERF) has just awarded two grants to our congregation, to reduce the emissions from our hot water. At the main church kitchen and the final student house, the SERF will pay half the cost of replacing gas water heaters with electric heat pumps. The other two units at the student house are already heat pumps; across the whole church we will now have just one gas water heater that isn't used very heavily. The pollution from these electric water heaters will steadily drop over the next decade as the electric grid decarbonises, and we might get the chance to accelerate this with more solar panels if there is a future SERF round.

QUEENSCLIFF UC

(these are excerpts of a letter to the moderator)

The final element of our transition off gas at the Manse was to replace a gas underfloor ducted heating system. We were enabled to carry out this project through the SERF Grant of \$9,860 awarded in December 2024. The installation was fully funded by the grant and was completed on 24 January at the quoted price! A really "Good News Story".

We offer our support (as well as great thanks) for the SERF grants process, and therefore recommend to Synod that it continue providing a continuing Synod allocation for grants in 2025 and beyond.

Non-Placement Pastor—Level 2 Position Description

We are looking for a person who will be the Chaplain to the students and staff at the Melbourne Southbank Campus. The position will be 2 days a week and be a non-placement pastor position and paid at a level 2 rate according to the synod ministerial pay rate. The Chaplain will be providing pastoral care and gathering young people around the ethos of the Uniting Church. The chaplain will be accountable to the Northcote Uniting Church Council.

Key selection criteria - Qualifications and experience — Degree-level education is required; Experience of chaplaincy work or similar would be helpful; Proven track record of working with young people in pastoral settings; Appropriate theological qualifications or preparedness to enter into a plan of study as determined in consultation with the presbytery PRC; Membership of a UCA congregation, or preparedness to join one; Accreditation by the Council of Chaplaincies in Tertiary Institutions.
