

Celebrating 800 years of Caring for Creation St. Francis of Assisi

In 2025, the church will celebrate the 800th anniversary of the composition of **the Canticle of the Creatures.** In the spring of 1225, shortly after his experience at La Verna, St. Francis of Assisi chose to spend fifty days at the Monastery of San Damiano, where St. Clare and the first Poor Sisters lived. During his stay at San Damiano, Francis had been suffering through a night of pain caused by his illnesses, when he was visited by the Lord, who reassured him of His love and salvation. This event led Francis to compose the hymn of praise and thanksgiving to God that we all know.





Most High, all-powerful, good Lord, Yours are the praises, the glory, and the honour and all blessing. To You alone, Most High, do they belong, and no human is worthy to mention Your name.

Praised be you, my Lord, with all Your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, who is the day, and through whom You give us light. And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendour; and bears a likeness of You, Most High one.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars. In heaven You formed them clear and precious and beautiful.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Wind, and through the air, cloudy and serene, and every kind of weather through which you give sustenance to your creatures.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister water, who is very useful and humble and precious and chaste. Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother fire, through whom You light the night, and he is beautiful and playful and robust and strong.

Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs.

Praised be You, my Lord, through those who give pardon for Your love, and bear infirmity and tribulation. Blessed be those who endure in peace, for by You, Most High, shall they be crowned.

Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape.

Woe to those who die in mortal sin. Blessed are those whom death will find in Your most holy will, for the second death shall do them no harm.

Praise and bless my Lord and give Him thanks and serve Him with great humility.

The church owes a great debt to St. Francis of Assisi and to his *Canticle of the Creatures* for leading it to the conviction that all brother and sister creatures make up one family under God's loving care! All these wonderful creatures continue to lift our hearts upward to God in this glorious prayer of praise.

St Francis' unqualified love of all creatures, great and small, had grown into unity in his own heart. He was so open to reality that it found a place to be at home in his heart and he was at home everywhere and anywhere. He was a centre of communion with all creatures.

2025 is also the 10th Anniversary of **the encyclical letter of Pope Francis**, **Laudato Si': on care for our common home.** The title comes from the canticle of Saint Francis, "**LAUDATO SI'**, **mi' Signore**" – "Praise be to you, my Lord", and sets the theme for Catholic Church teaching that addresses both the environmental challenges facing the world and persistent poverty, weaving the two themes together as aspects of the same spiritual illness facing the world today. Pope Francis identifies the solution as a spiritual one and calls all human beings to embrace an **ecological conversion** in which they become inter-related and inter-dependent with all beings.

It would be wonderful if all Christians could pray The Canticle of Creatures throughout 2025, as a path to ecological conversion and a new relationship with the Earth and all of God's creatures.

PROTECTIONS FOR PACIFIC ISLAND WORKERS IN AUSTRALIA YIELD BENEFITS

We have requested that you write letters several times to improve the situation for people working on horticultural farms in Australia, including people from the Pacific Islands working on the Pacific

Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) Scheme.

The horticulture sector in Australia has historically been rife with wage theft and mistreatment of workers.

A key problem that occurred on the PALM Scheme was that some employers on the Scheme would bring

out workers from the Pacific Islands to work in Australia but not have lined up enough work for them. As a result, the workers would end up in financial hardship and unable to send money back to their families at home.

We lobbied for reforms to address the problem, and the current government responded by requiring employers to provide a minimum of 120 hours of work every four weeks. In November 2024, the government announced that checks on employers on the PALM Scheme showed they were complying with the new requirement. The check involved nearly one in three of the agriculture and horticulture employers.

retailers across four states.

The testing showed that 25% of the products contained wood inconsistent with the declared species or place of origin. While the inconsistency is not necessarily evidence of illegality, it is a significant risk factor.

There was uncertainty around the origin of some of the products declared as Burmese teak. The JIM Cluster continues to campaign for the Australian Government to ban the importation of all timber and wood products from Myanmar, as at least part of the profits from the sale of such products goes to prop up the military junta in the country.

FURTHER GOVERNMENT ACTION ON ILLEGAL LOGGING

In 2024, there was a very positive development with the Federal Parliament passing reforms to improve the Australian law that prohibits the importation of timber and wood products that have been produced through illegal logging.

Many of you have taken action in support of the reforms over several years. In September 2024, the
Commonwealth Government reported
that they have been taking further action
to make the law more effective. The
Government commissioned research
into wood and timber products being
imported into Australia. They examined
everything from construction timber to
paper drinking straws and wooden hair
combs. Over 170 products covering
39 species were examined from 40

VICTORIAN TREATY NEGOTIATIONS BEGIN

On 13 January 2025 the Victorian Government and the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria jointly announced where the focus of treaty negotiations would be focused.

Treaty is about making a better and fairer state for all Victorians.

Key areas to be addressed in the Treaty will include measures to support reconciliation, truth, education and healing between First Peoples' and those who have come since European oolonisation. The Treaty will also consider the role of a representative body of First Peoples in decision-making relating to Victorian Government programs and services for First Peoples.

Congregations can make statements in support of the Victorian Treaty
Process. So far, St Michael's Uniting
Church in the CBD, Brunswick Uniting
Church and Sophia's Spring Uniting
Church have made such statements,
which have been provided to the
First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria,
along with the Statement made by the
Synod. If your congregation would also

like to make a statement in support of the Treaty Process, there is still time to do so.





John Wesley Political World

Prof. Glen O'Brien

This book employs a global history approach to John Wesley's (1703–1791) political and social tracts. It stresses the personal element in Wesley's political thought, focusing on the twin themes of 'liberty and loyalty'. Wesley's political writings reflect on the impact of global conflicts on Britain and provide insight into the political responses of the broader religious world of the eighteenth century.

They cover such topics as the nature and origin of political power, economy, taxes, trade, opposition to slavery and to smuggling, British rule in Ireland, relaxation of anti-Catholic Acts, and the American Revolution. Glen O'Brien argues that Wesley's political foundations were less theological than they were social and personal. Political engagement was exercised as part of a social contract held together by a compact of trust.

The book contributes to eighteenth-century religious history, and to Wesley Studies in particular, through a fresh engagement with primary sources and recent secondary literature in order to place Wesley's writings in their global political context.

I'm recovering from COVID, again, but it's taking longer this time - I tested positive before Christmas. Chronic illness isn't new to me, but this "long-COVID" has forced me to pay attention to my body in a way I haven't in a long time. Because when I don't, I literally drop.




