Meetings make a difference

Good leadership requires good meetings. Unfortunately, this reality can often be buried underneath our negative feelings about church administration. God called us into ministry so we can do pastoral care, work for justice, proclaim the gospel as preachers and teachers, etc. — who wants to sit through meetings all week?

Years ago, Louis Weeks, president emeritus of Union Presbyterian Seminary, acknowledged that administration is often regarded as “scutwork,” the work nobody wants to do. He tried to recast the administrative responsibilities of the church in a more positive light. Scutwork, he argued, is an essential part of a flourishing ministry. Someone has to plan the worship service so the music, prayers and message are presented with intention. Someone has to schedule maintenance to ensure the congregation is a good steward of its facilities.

This brings us to meetings. It may be helpful to think about the opportunity they offer you to do ministry in a more faithful way. For example, they provide an excellent opportunity to work through conflict. When we avoid meetings because of conflict, the conflict festers and becomes even more difficult to manage. Hosting a hospitable meeting with the affected parties can lead to reconciliation and a better working relationship.

Meetings also create space to invite participation and solicit genuine input. Having a planned conversation with a staff member, church volunteer or ministry group lets them know that what they have to say is important. When leaders use the agenda to foster dialogue, people will know that leaders care about what they have to say, and they will tell the leader what they really think.

Administrative and ministry meetings are an opportunities to build relationships and foster collaboration. In a culture that is hyper-focused on efficiency, it doesn’t take long to lose people’s confidence with meetings that don’t seem relevant. I’ve learned to make every effort to start the meeting on time and to communicate clearly when you want the meeting to end. In this respect, a good meeting is like a good sermon. It needs to have an organized starting point and a definite conclusion. Also, like a good sermon, good meetings require preparation. **Do your homework. Bring relevant information. Ask generative questions. And it never hurts to bring snacks.**

The Meeting Together workbook will assist **Church Councils, Committees and groups** in the Uniting Church to work more collaboratively, to understand the role of their group and leadership in the wider life of the church, and to deal with poor behaviour in meetings.

It can help to build the capacity in our members to meet and work together well, to respect and listen to one another, and to value each person's voice. It looks at the Scriptures and what we believe, the Basis of Union, the Manual for Meetings, and other resources. The booklet includes 14 short sections that can each be used to start discussion, plus resources for community building. These resources are an invitation to pause from what we do, and to have conversations about why and how we meet.

BOOK REVIEW:

Imagining All Generations

A Renewed Vision for an Intergenerational Church

Many churches today face worry and concern over their collective future. One tragic consequence is that growing anxiety can turn inward on communities of faith. A subtle distancing and dividing can occur, often happening along generational lines. Us-versus-Them thinking morphs into Old-versus-Young. Instead of a culture of generation to generation, churches are shaped and formed more by a culture of generation versus generation. [Imagining All Generations](#) offers a better, more faithful way forward by remembering our identity as the generational people of God. This volume features nineteen authors from around the world, providing fresh theological reflection, innovative practical wisdom, and a unified call for all churches to move into a more intergenerational future by answering four key questions:



What theology and theory support an intergenerational vision of the church?

What are researchers and practitioners learning about how to meaningfully bring together different generations in communities of faith?

How can churches better share faith among various age groups within their congregation?

How might we reimagine worship as a time and place where every generation brings a valuable contribution ?

Fundamentals of Transitional Ministry is a 3

-day program designed to give participants an introduction to the key concepts and practices of ministering with congregations and agencies in times of transition.

While it is a stand-alone program, it is also the first phase of training that leads to being qualified as an Intentional Interim Minister. Thus, it is useful in itself for anyone in lay or ordained ministry, and also for those exploring whether they are called to Intentional Interim Ministry.

This initial three-day course is especially helpful for:

- People in Presbytery leadership roles
- People in the latter half of Third Phase of Ministry
- Ministers intending to do significant amounts of supply
- Ministers moving from chaplaincy/agency roles into congregational ministry
- Ministers in placements going through significant transitions, such as looking for new mission directions, contemplating combining/closing, moving to resource ministry.

Transitional ministry

Fundamentals of Transitional Ministry is a three-day online program in May introducing the key concepts and practices of ministering in times of transition.
